He liked to wear those silky button up shirts and spit shined shoes when he was heading 'out'. he'd do a little fancy footwork that just couldn't qualify as dancing. once he drove a convertible where the trunk would lift and the top would glide back into the trunk- it was cool. he had a shepherd named Rex, a lb named Blackie, two hunting dogs one named after a sister and the other named Pepsi. he liked picnics and swimming at Madison Lake. his favorite cake was german chocolate and ice cream was butter pecan. he liked Pattons pizza best at one time. he liked watching ALL the westerns on tv and sometimes The twilight Zone. he had a ninth grade education and married at age 17.....good times and bad, I remember lots; times I called him Dad.
